○授業の到達目標及びテーマ(Theme and objectives) To study global governance from both theory and empirical aspects, to acquire the basic knowledge of global governance and to obtain ability of application to empirical reality.			
○授業の概要(Basic outline) The level of this course is from introductory level to intermediate level regarding global governance at graduate level. The concept of global governance emerged in the 1990s after the end of the Cold War but does not have an agreed upon definition and thus it is a contested concept. However, the concept of global governance has now been applied to varied fields and that trend will be accelerated into the future. Therefore, the purpose of the course is to: clarify the concept as much as possible; to, at the same time, look into its analytical framework and case studies systematically, and to demonstrate usefulness of global governance. This course comprises five parts. The first part will be devoted to an overview of global governance. In the second part, we will deal with three issue-areas and demonstrate how the concept of global governance will be applied. The three areas are: economics/environment; security; and international norms. The third part is to cover regional governance and show that global governance framework is readily applicable to regional phenomena. In the fourth part, we examine how non-state actors play in the international arena as a party to global/regional governance. In the fifth part, some important analytical concepts are introduced as they relate to global governance such as accountability and public/collective goods.			
○授業の方法 (Method of Teaching) The course will be conducted along with the syllabus shown below. The instructor provides the Power Point Panels for each of the sessions and makes a lecture along the materials and then proceeds to a question/answers and discussion exchange with the students.
