By understanding the issues in 1960s, 70s and 80s, students will be able to argue the important agendas, such as how the postwar world order was developed; why the Cold War ended; and why the US has been leading the world order. Readings will be distributed beforehand. Each class will begin with a student's presentation, followed by a discussion session. Students are required to write a 4000 words term paper.
