<b>○授業の到達目標及びテーマ</b> <p>This course provides an introduction to international trade policy. The course aims to provide an understanding of the economic theory/theories of international trade policy as well as rules, institutions, and major policy issues facing the global trading system. The goal of the course is to learn an analytical foundation for issues in international trade policy.</p>			
<b>○授業の概要</b> <p>The course presents a treatment of the theory of international trade policy to explore the economic and distributional impacts of conventional trade barriers such as import tariffs and quotas as well as other types of policy such as non-tariff barriers (NTBs) and subsidies. The course also deals with the international (and national) institutions of trade and trade policy, especially the GATT/WTO system, to investigate principles, rules and agreements relating to major trade policies such as safeguards, anti-dumping, and subsidies and countervailing duties. The course, toward the end, discusses issues in the world trading system including regional trade agreements, foreign investment, challenges presented by deeper international economic integration, and issues in trade and development and developing countries as well.</p>			
<b>○授業の方法</b> <p>Lectures will be given in English, and in an interactive manner wherever possible. Questions, comments, and discussion during a class are welcome or rather encouraged. Students are thus expected to prepare for each class by reading assigned items and be ready to actively participate. The course assumes students' mastery of or familiarity with an advanced (or intermediate, at least) level of undergraduate microeconomics. It is also strongly recommended that students have completed the course of International Economics (1 Fall).</p>
