○授業の到達目標及びテーマ The aim of the course is to provide the students with basic knowledge of East Asia's international relations, with a focus on Japan's international relations.			
○授業の概要 As one of the major countries in international society, Japan's behavior affects the consequence of international affairs, if not decisively. This course will introduce students to key issues on Japan's foreign policy with a focus on security dimension. The course is prepared for students who had studied International Relations and would like to take further study on international relations in Asia. To deepen the understanding of the students on Japan's international relations, the course explains factors driving Japan's foreign policy by paying attention to both international and domestic structures. Please note that the course has a heavy reading load; all students are expected to actively participate in class discussions after the lecture and analyze issues from theoretical perspectives.
