○授業の到達目標及びテーマ The aim of the course is to provide the students with basic knowledge of East Asia's international relations, with a focus on Japan's international relations.			
○授業の概要 <p>Focusing on Japan's foreign policy, this course will introduce students to critical issues regarding international relations in the Asia-Pacific region. On the one hand, the region has long attracted worldwide attention as an engine of world economic growth. On the other, Asia's fragile security situation, symbolized by North Korea's nuclear adventurism and China's economic and military expansion, has concerned many states in the world. That means Asia, where Japan is located, is a complex region with full potential for economic growth and a risk of conflict. This course examines international relations in Asia since WWII, including new security and economic dynamics.</p> <p>Please note that all students are expected to participate in class discussions after each lecture actively and analyze issues from theoretical perspectives.</p> <p>○授業の方法 Lectures will be provided at the first 50min, which will be followed by class discussion by students.</p>
